The CNA encourages neighbors to bring one or more of the following items to the Holiday Party to donate to the clientele at the HIV Day Center:


- Warm sleeping bags in good condition



Past, Present and Future Chairman

The Concordia Neighborhood Association (CNA) has elected me to be the chair of their board in 2011. I owe much thanks to my new co-chair, Robin Johnson, and to Anne Rothert and Belinda Clark, our departing chair and co-chair, respectively. Thanks to their leadership, Robin and I are inheriting a full roster of board members committed to one of the most active neighborhood associations in our twelve neighborhood coalition.

At a glance, the CNA takes on local issues of concern to our neighbors like new crosswalks with flashing lights, crime prevention, and airport noise. We plant trees, sponsor concerts in the park and put on the Easter egg hunt. We've secured play structures in the park and we are working on signage to remind people to keep their pets on a lead unless they are in the "off leash" zone so that parents and children can feel safe.

Many neighborhood issues are brought before us and we resolve them one by one. In the bigger picture we are participants in the Northeast Coalition of Neighborhoods (NECN). Some of our board members also serve on the board of this umbrella organization for the twelve neighborhoods that comprise northeast Portland. At this level, we take on bigger neighborhood and city-wide issues.

We at the NECN are concerned about the effects on our neighborhoods of the Columbia River Crossing (CRC), which is the new Interstate 5 bridge design. There is a food waste, bio-gas generating plant proposed for a site upwind of us at 6849 NE Columbia Blvd. which we have taken up. Additionally, the NECN disagrees with the new city policy of charging for leaf removal in the better-treed neighborhoods.

Above the NECN is the Office of Neighborhood Involvement (ONI), representing all of the city's neighborhoods. At that level we speak with a unified voice directly to the city council members and the mayor. Our voices together are amplified and the call for action and results begins with your neighborhood association. I hope that you too will come to our neighborhood meetings and help us to provide an ever improving quality of life for you and your fellow neighbors.

Learning Landscape Tree Plantings Friday December 10

On Friday, December 10 the Concordia Tree Team will be planting its second installment of the "Learning Landscape Plantings" at the Meek Protech High School, 4039 NE Alberta Ct. We'll be planting rain or shine. If you want to help out, please sign in at the school at 9:45 a.m. the morning of the event. We'll gather in the asphalted area behind the school.

A Safe Driving Alternative for Older Adults Local nonprofit, Ride Connection, seeks to alleviate the affects of giving up the keys.

Beaverton resident Judy Melcher has been using Ride Connection transportation services for about two years. After living in the same home for thirty years, Judy voluntarily gave up driving over time. Too much traffic, she says. She states firmly that after reaching a certain age, people probably shouldn't be driving. But she adds, "Giving up driving is a big thing." And, she says, being alone gets worse when you give up driving.

That is where Ride Connection and their network of community service partners come into play. Since May of 1985 Ride Connection has provided transportation options, resources, and services for older adults (60+) and people with disabilities in the tri-county region. Last year alone, Ride Connection provided over 393,000 rides.

Bill and Joyce Malk, of Troutdale, who gave up their keys long ago and utilize Ride Connection's services, not only are they thankful for the service, so is Vickee, their daughter. Vickee states, "For me living here in Bend, it is a gift to know my folks can have safe and reliable transportation."

Getting a ride is simple: someone calls three to four days in advance and Ride Connection schedules a ride to the grocery store, pharmacy, visit a loved one, or wherever. One of the best things is that there is no cost for the service, though donations are greatly appreciated and needed. "There is a tsunami of baby boomers coming. In 15 years, one in five drivers will be 65 or older which will nearly double the number from 30 million to 57 million," states Executive Director Elaine Wells. "With the increasing population of older adults, it is important that Ride Connection is there to provide a solution for drivers who are giving up their keys."

Want to be a part of the solution? Ride Connection and its partners have over 600 drivers with 2/3

of those being volunteers. For those people not interested in driving, the average cost of a trip to the grocery store is \$12.50. For more information call (503) 226-0700

What Has CNA and Its Committees Done For Me?

A good question. And we wouldn't have asked that question if we didn't have a lot of ammunition to back up a positive response. CNA acts both as a group of neighbors and businesses working together through its elected board and as volunteer committees and individuals.

In the past five or so years, Concordia NA has been recognized throughout Portland as an active, can-do organization thanks to the folks who have stepped forward and taken on tasks and issues that needed to be addressed. Here's just a quick list of small and large accomplishments. As you read the list, we encourage you to join in new and continuing projects. All you have to do is ask – or propose ideas of your own.

- 30th Avenue and Killingsworth Street: marked crosswalks and a flashing pedestrian light across the busy Foxchase intersection.
- The flashing pedestrian crossing light at New Seasons Market on NE 33rd Avenue.
- The marked pedestrian crosswalk at NE 37th Avenue and Killingsworth Street.
- Speed bumps on NE 37th Avenue near Fernhill Park.
- Yellow no-parking curb markings on the cul-desac and by driveways on NE Sumner Street near

the park, and increased parking patrols.

- A return of Fernhill Park to neighborhood use and a decrease of use by out of area soccer and other sports teams.
- After seven years of effort, new and now heavily used playground equipment at Fernhill.
- Friday night summer concerts with hundreds in attendance.
- Blocks of new handicapped-access curb cuts and extensions
- Much wider area and spread out flight paths for cargo planes, instead of flying a single route directly over the Concordia neighborhood.
- Success in convincing PDX to include many more neighborhood representatives in its 30-year expansion plans now before the city council. Prior to that, we had 3 reps.
- A stop to city-wide teardown of good, restorable homes and their replacement by rows of "skinny houses" and split lots.
- Taking on housing developers who violate regulations and the spirit of the law, and appealing the bad practices to city and state hearings.

- Securing Good Neighbor Agreements, including compromises between neighbors and a) liquorserving establishments, b) new housing and commercial development, and c) major construction projects (like Concordia Univ.'s expansion and Meek High School's remodel).
- · Concordia-wide yard sales and clean-ups.
- Massive tree planting projects. Adding to the Ainsworth Street "horizontal arboretum" and orchestrating a first-of-its-kind street tree assessment.
- Maintaining our community room at Kennedy School and making it available for many community groups and activities, as well as improving street parking and driveway access for nearby neighbors.
- Obtaining a reduction in VOCs (volatile organic compounds) that are being released into our airshed by Boeing's two paint factories. Boeing committed to major million-dollar retrofitting to meet tougher standards.
- Lastly, our annual Christmas parties, which because of crowds have had to move to much larger facilities at Concordia University.

This is just a sampling. Please join us.



The parents and faculty of Vernon K-8 school on NE 20th Avenue and Killingsworth Street participate in the school's growing Parent Teacher Association for many reasons, but we all can identify a principle that we all share: we want to invest in our children's school and foster a vibrant community that will create a positive impact on our family, our neighbors, and the city at large.

Many Vernon families have made deliberate choices to have our children attend Vernon school not only because we have high hopes for our child's education, but because we live, shop, play, bike, eat, walk, and gather near the streets, shops, parks, and sidewalks of this neighborhood. CNA Passes Important Community Resolutions

Although Concordia neighborhood is not directly on the route of the proposed Columbia River Crossing, we might be close enough to feel many impacts of the current design. Concordia's neighbors along the I-5 corridor - who will definitely be affected - took their concerns to the Northeast Coalition of Neighborhoods (NECN), a coalition of Concordia and 11 other neighborhood associations. NECN and its Board are asking that the leadership of CRC reconsider the possible effects of its current plan and look at alternatives that are less expensive, less intrusive on people's livability, more viable, and more socially just.

At our last general meeting, CNA's land use and transportation committees asked those in attendance to discuss their ideas about the project and to approve a resolution of concern. It passed (with one abstention) as follows: "The Concordia Neighborhood Association encourages the CRC Commission to revisit the alternatives to their current plan

and to engage and involve all the neighborhoods to be affected."

A second step was to take the resolution to the full CNA Board. They approved the previous resolution and added a second one: "The Concordia Neighborhood Association Board specifically encourages the Portland area's elected officials to rethink the existing capacity and structure of our transportation system. This should include studying the inclusion of high speed rail (HSR) in the plans for the CRC and for future transportation development in the I-5 corridor."

These resolutions have been sent to the CRC Commission and to local elected officials. Additionally the board is planning to invite our local elected officials to meet with our Concordia NA residents at our Tuesday, January 4 general meeting. We hope that you can make it and have a say in one of the major public construction projects in Oregon history.
